HOST COUNTRY CALL FOR THE 10TH AFRICAN POPULATION CONFERENCE (APC)

UAPS officially launched the Call for Host Country for the 10th African Population Conference (APC), one of the continent's most prestigious convening platforms for population scientists, policymakers, and development stakeholders. Member states and institutions were invited to submit expressions of interest and full bid proposals to host this landmark event.



Submission Deadline: 31st March 2026



Expected Conference Year: 2028



Estimated Attendance: 1000 participants

STATA TRICKS: A THREE-PART WEBINAR FOR AFRICAN GRADUATE STUDENTS

The American Institutes for Research (AIR) P3 Africa, in collaboration with the African Economic Research Consortium (AERC) and UAPS, recently invited graduate students at African universities to a three-part webinar series on STATA tricks, the second of such events.

Hosted by Professor Sudhanshu Handa, Institute Fellow at AIR and Kenan Eminent Professor of Public Policy at the University of North Carolina, and featuring Dr. Paul Sirma, Researcher at UNICEF, the sessions were designed to help participants sharpen their data visualization and regression output presentation skills.

Participants gained practical knowledge and tools across three key areas: creating rich descriptive graphs including kernel densities and bar charts with overlays and confidence intervals; using OUTREG and OUTREG2 to produce journal-quality tables for research manuscripts; and accessing sample STATA code for hands-on practice.

The series ran over three consecutive Wednesdays — 9, 16, and 23 April 2026 — from 4:00–5:00PM EAT / 1:00–2:00 PM GMT, offering an accessible and practical learning experience for graduate students across the continent.

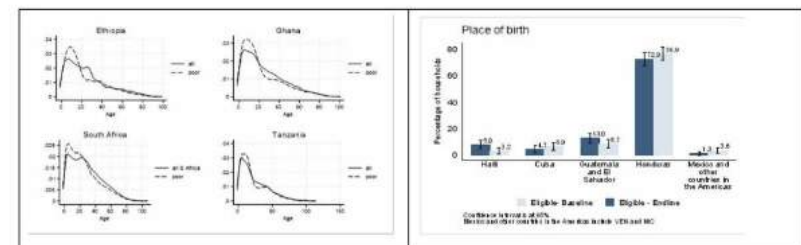


STATA Tricks: A Three-Part Webinar for African Graduate Students

WEST AND CENTRAL AFRICA WORKSHOP ON CHILD MARRIAGE AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE

Policymakers, researchers and development partners gathered in Dakar, Senegal from April 29 to May 1, 2026, to deliberate on population issues shaping the region's development trajectory. Hosted at Hotel Fleur des Lys and convened by UAPS, APHRC and PHERI, the three-day event brought together experts from across the region to strengthen the evidence base on these critical issues.

The workshop opened with a keynote address providing a regional overview of trends, drivers, and policy implications, followed by expert panels featuring voices from UNFPA, ECOWAS, WAHO, Girls Not Brides, Plan International, and government ministries. Authors presented their research concepts and received structured feedback through paper review clinics and one-on-one mentor

consultations aimed at raising the quality of manuscripts destined for a special issue of the Journal of African Population Studies (JAPS). The workshop conveyed about 50 participants including junior first authors, methods and method experts, implementers and reviewers, youth & CSO leaders, facilitators and representatives from AU, ECOWAS, UNICEF and UNFPA.

The conference featured plenary sessions, parallel thematic panels, and a special session on child marriage and sexual violence in West and Central Africa. The workshop concluded with a clear publication roadmap and renewed commitment among stakeholders to close the evidence gap on child marriage and gender-based violence across the region.

SCIENTIFIC THEMATIC PANEL ACTIVITIES

GENDER EQUALITY PANEL GATHERS DIVERSE VOICES ACROSS THE CONTINENT

Because gender equality is too often reduced to preconceived ideas and fixed positions, the Gender Equality Thematic Panel of UAPS launched an initiative during this year's International Women's Month to gather diverse perspectives on what gender equality truly means — and what it should look like in our societies today. The initiative invited contributions from people across all backgrounds and experiences: women, men, young people, students, researchers, academics, practitioners, policymakers, civil society actors, development professionals, and members of diverse communities. Participants were encouraged to share their thoughts in the form of a comment, a short quote, or a video, in response to the question:



What does gender equality mean to you, and what should it look like in society today? The Gender Equality Thematic Panel of the Union for African Population Studies (UAPS) is launching something we're genuinely excited about. "Voices of African Women" is a new series dedicated to spotlighting the lived experiences, leadership journeys, and contributions of African women working across population, gender, health, and development. Through honest, accessible storytelling, the series aims to inform public discourse, inspire the next generation of researchers and advocates, and amplify African-led narratives — on African terms.

The UAPS Gender Equality Thematic Panel works at the intersection of research, capacity building, and policy dialogue. Its focus: tackling gender inequality through evidence, surfacing root causes of disparity, and championing the visibility of women whose work too often goes unrecognized. This series is an extension of that mission.

WHAT TO EXPECT

CALL FOR PAPERS: THE NEXUS BETWEEN POPULATION DYNAMICS AND CLIMATE CHANGE IN SUB-SAHARAN AFRICA

UAPS, through its Scientific Thematic Panel on Population Growth Dynamics and Climate Change, has issued a Call for Papers for a special issue of the Journal of African Population Studies (JAPS) on the theme: The Nexus Between Population Dynamics and Climate Change in Sub-Saharan Africa: Evidence, Policy, and Pathways for Action.

Sub-Saharan Africa faces a dual challenge — rapid demographic transformation and acute vulnerability to climate change. This special issue seeks to bridge the gap between these two critical areas by bringing together evidence-based research, innovative methodologies, and policy-relevant insights that illuminate how population dynamics and climate systems interact across the continent.

We welcome empirical and conceptual papers, case studies, and policy reviews across a range of thematic areas, including climate-induced migration, urbanisation and climate vulnerability, gender and climate justice, reproductive health in a changing climate, and policy integration strategies, among others. The call is open to scholars and practitioners in population studies, climate science, public health, urban studies, and related disciplines, with particular encouragement for African-based researchers and early-career scholars.

Submissions should be between 6,000 and 8,000 words, in English or French, and must adhere to JAPS formatting requirements. The full paper submission deadline is 1 September 2026, with the special issue expected for publication in June 2027.

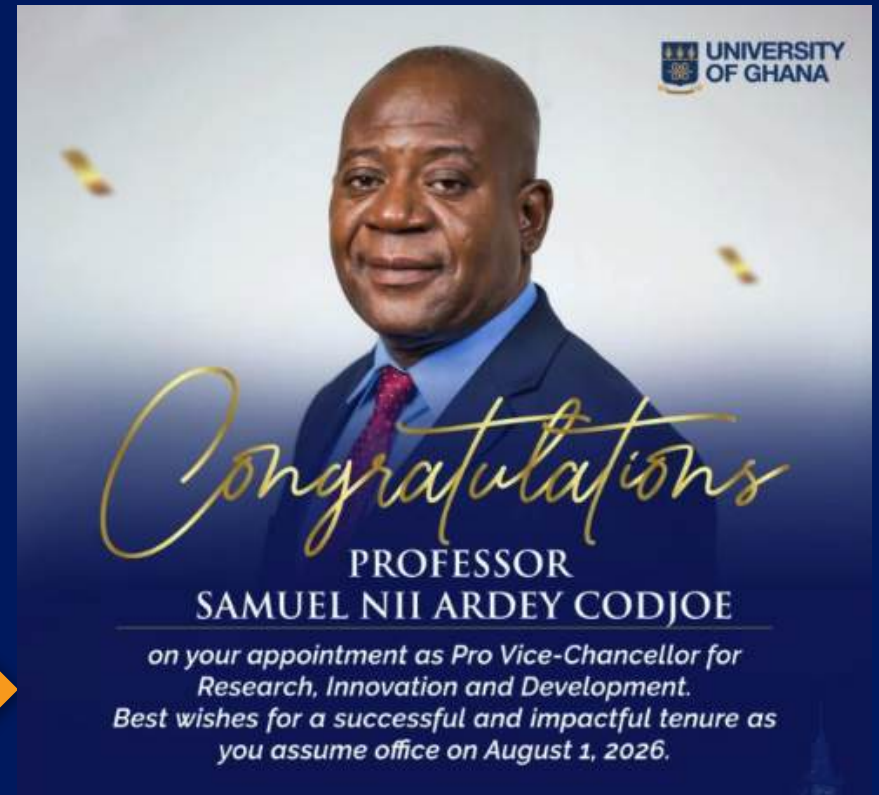
